I am positive I am not the only one feeling this way!

Given that we can't do anything about the temperature and the weather, there are a lot of proactive measures we can take to increase our chances of success for the 2018 metal detecting season. The first of course, is to get your hands on some old maps. Every town and county you can think of is available on-line. Many of these are available to download for a small fee and some are free. You can also just simply take a screen shot of an area in particular for assistance in research. The following is a screen shot I took of an old map the town of Bridgewater from an Oneida County Atlas. You can select any town or area you are interested in searching. Compare a current map to an older one and you can find the sites that do not exist anymore that tend to produce some of the better finds. A great point of reference on these old maps is the water features. Lakes, ponds, rivers and streams haven't moved much since these maps were made!

Go and pay a visit to the Oneida County Historical Society. This is a great way to spend an afternoon, look at the displays and talk to the very helpful and friendly staff. I am positive you will come away with some ideas for hunt sites. The Society is located at 1608 Genesee St in Utica. The hours are generally 10:00AM to 4:00PM.

The winter is also a good time to go through your back issues of metal detecting publications. My two favorites are **American Digger Magazine** and **Western and Eastern Treasures**. I highly recommend that you subscribe to these magazines. If you do subscribe and hold on to your back issues, flip through them. When I do this, I always come across a tip or two, have an idea for a new site or a new way to display finds.

Another way to scratch that metal detecting itch while the temperatures hover around zero degrees is to view metal detecting videos on the internet. A quick Google search on this topic will literally result in thousands of hits. Some favorites include the Stealth Diggers, the Hoover Boys, and Aquachigger. I just did a search and several videos grabbed my attention including "Metal Detecting an 1800's swimming Hole" and "Metal Detecting and old Farm, Huge Silver and Lots of Coins".

As a final note on this months' message, we always have a need to fill the pipeline of monthly speakers/presenters. **Mike Parker** had an interesting idea to have a farmer come in and discuss the different types of equipment they use as well as planting schedules for various crops. This will be interesting as we search a lot of farm fields and also find a lot of "machine parts" on these fields. Please let me know the leads you can think of for monthly speakers so we can begin lining them up for meetings in 2018.
