Lake Delta Bible Conference Center Hunt

Sixteen EARTH club members showed up for a club hunt at the Lake Delta Bible Conference Center on Saturday October 17th. It was a chilly start to the day with frost in some of the low-lying areas. Most everyone arrived between 8:30 and 9:30 but a few trickled in throughout the day.

Those who attended were Pat Britton, Frank Washicosky, Mike Parker, Robert Thomas, Brandon Snyder, Lori Fealey, Ruth Bohm, Ed Netzband, Margaret Ferjet, John & Diane Hammond, Mike Wusik, Bill Wilson, Stu & Alicia Copperwheat, Sheila Himmelman and myself.

This is the second time we held this hunt here and both outings were held under ideal conditions. I always knew this place existed and about 10 years ago I sent off a letter to them asking the person in charge if we could hold a club hunt on their grounds. The director at the time wrote back and said that he would like to save the area for future campers in case anyone wished to metal detect.

Now, fast forward to 2 summers ago when Patty and I went to a garage sale near the site and to my surprised it was the home of the new director of the Conference Center, Steve Clark. Steve wasn't home but his wife was there conducting the sale. After I learned who this was, I laid out all the information on what we'd like to do so she gave me his card and I emailed him, he said okay and the rest is history.

I emailed all those who attended to let me know what they had found: Sheila Himmelman said she dug "a bunch of trash and should get an award for cleaning up the place." Pat Britten had a short day but dug some new coinage, a wheat cent and some pull tabs & nails. Alicia dug 27 modern coins, a wheat cent and a cheapo ring. Alicia dug a piece of gold last year. Husband Stu found 37 new coins, an old toy tank, a flattened Jerusalem Ring and while walking out along one of the gravel roads dug a worn 1887 Barber dime. The site is almost 100 years old.

Margaret Ferjet found 8 memorials, 1 quarter, a matchbox police pickup truck and an old Scotch tape metal dispenser. Lori Fealey dug a boat drain plug, a cake decorating tip, flattend toy helicopter, a Fugio Cent with the word "COPY" stamped on it. Lori also found \$1.50 in clad. Mike Parker found a boy's "wait" ring, 1 wheatback cent and 14 quarters. Mike is on a mission this season to dig 1000 quarters. He is in the 900s already and he's bound and determined*.

I dug 30 memorial cents, 7 wheat cents, 4 quarters and 5 dimes. I also found a 1943 Washington quarter a '43-P war nickel, a small sterling ring and a tiny toy space shuttle. I didn't hear back from anyone else but I know that Bob Thomas detecting around an abandoned horseshoe pit and dug a full set of shoes... all 4! Before we left Bob and I went into the conference center and found Steve and presented him with the shoes. He was grateful and said he'd paint 'em up.



DIGSTOCK Mini is the first of our smaller hunts geared towards the more experienced treasure hunters, but everyone of all ages and skill levels are welcome. Our inaugural event will take place March 5-7th, 2021 near Greenville, North Carolina. Compared to our Fall hunt, DIGSTOCK 2021, this one will have less frills, but just as much fun.

The property we have acquired is rife with history dating back to before colonial times. The 2200+ acre site features fields, forests, and riverfront. With over 40+ homesites, 2 colonial plantations, a couple of bottle dumps, Native American village, and a rumored British Revolutionary War camp, there won't be a lack of places



to explore. According to the landowners and our research, this property has been untouched by detectorists, a rare thing these days! The cost for the event is \$225 per person for the entire weekend, and includes a Sunday Southern BBQ lunch, 3 free raffle tickets, and is limited to 275 participants.

The adventure starts on the evening of Friday, March 5th, 2021 with our Meet and Greet/Rules Meeting. Due to the ongoing COVID 19 crisis, this may be rescheduled to the morning of the hunt. The hunt will begin at 7:30 am and all participants must be off the fields no later than 6 pm both Saturday and Sunday. There will be a food truck onsite Saturday and you will be treated to a Southern BBQ lunch that is included with your ticket on Sunday. We will be selling raffle tickets for metal detecting gear and other goodies from Friday through Sunday at 12pm, with the drawings taking place just after lunch that day.
