## **Changes Coming to the Monthly Competition**

The monthly finds competition will be going through yet another change making it more exciting and allowing more members to participate. This competition started in April of 2001 by then president the late John Seamon. At that time we only had one simple category, "best item of the month".

Because there were other deserving items being entered, in April of 2002, we split the categories in two... "Coins" and "Other." This continued on until April of 2005 when we felt the need to add another category. With more members hunting beaches and entering rings and jewelry, the club decided to add a "jewelry" category.

Over more recent years three other notable changes in the competition happened. In the spring of 2011, we were beginning to notice more first place ties with an increasing number of members always voting for themselves regardless of what else was on the table. So, in April of that year we eliminated first place ties with a show of hands. The loser was dropped to second place and second place slipped into the third spot.

Another small adjustment in the competition came in 2016. The snow left central New York a month early so we moved the competition up to March. The last notable change came in 2020. With the Coronavirus wreaking havoc on gatherings, we didn't hold meetings much less competitions.

### Raffle Table

Beginning this month we will be alternating the 2 raffle contests holding one every other month. One month it will be a 50/50 and the next month will be a raffle drawing. We're just splitting the same size pie in a different way. By doing it this way will make our raffle prizes go further. At last month's board and officers meeting it was decided to expand the mystery category so it would be on the same plain as the other 3 categories. Beginning this April, instead of the winner of the mystery category being awarded 5 points, there will be 10 points for 1st, 7 for 2nd, 5 for 3rd and a single point for entering, just like the other 3 categories.

Magnet fishing is becoming popular with many YouTube videos popping up online. It was decided to allow iron objects found by magnets to be allowed in the category where applicable.

### Dues

When the virus hit 2 years ago many members had already paid their dues for a year that never happened. We allowed members that paid to roll the dues over to the following year. Now, with the virus behind us and holding regular meetings the 2022 dues need to be paid by the meeting in January.

But with that month being in the middle of the winter and no meetings in January, we are allowing a grace period to the meeting in May. ### Life of Peter the Eagle

In the mid-1830s, Peter the bald eagle became a known figure in the city of Philadelphia. Peter resided in the Philadelphia Mint, a contrast from an eagle's typical habitat. Founded in 1792, The Philadelphia Mint was the first mint in the United States and responsible for the production of coins.

During the day Peter would stay indoors and fly around the mint. The workers loved having Peter be alongside them. Every night, Peter was let out and would fly around the city. He would return by morning before the workers arrived.

While perched on a coining press one day, the machine suddenly started. His wing got caught in the coining press and he became badly injured and unable to fly. While many mint workers tried to help Peter, his wing was in too poor of a condition and he ultimately passed away.

To pay homage to Peter, the mint employees took him to get taxidermied. He can be admired with his



wings stretched out at the main entrance of the United States Mint to greet his visitors. He has been on display for over 150 years. Peter is said to have been the model for the image of an eagle on the silver dollars issued from 1836 to 1839 and the Flying Eagle cent of 1856-1858.

Pennsylvania is abundant with forests and water sources, making it a place where many eagles live. The city of Philadelphia, Peter's hometown, is considered a great place to look for eagles due to its proximity to the Delaware River, a place to hunt for prey.

## Mohawk Valley Coin Club's Annual Coin Show Opens the Door to American History

You would be amazed at the history of the United States that you can learn by exploring our nation's currency.

On Sunday, March 27th you will have a chance to do just that by attending the Mohawk Valley Coin Club's annual Coin Show, which is being held from 10am to 3pm at the Deerfield Fire House, located on the corner of Trenton Road and Fire House Road.

The admission is only \$1.

The Coin Show features over 15 venders with coins and bills from the United States and from countries around the globe. There will also be door prizes and raffles.

Coin collecting can be an inexpensive hobby as some coins may be purchase for just a couple dollars. You may make some serious investment to. The vendors would be glad to share their knowledge.

They also sell bullion coins. The Chinese Panda can be purchased for under \$30 and some of these bullion coins have risen in value to almost \$500 in about 20 years.

Did you know that the first time the motto "In God We Trust" appeared on a coin was in 1864 and was on a two-cent piece? There was a public demand for the motto on coinage beginning during the Civil War.

During WWII, the metal composition of the Jefferson nickel included 35% silver as they needed nickel in the war effort. They also needed copper, so in 1943 the USA made zinc coated steel cents. There were a few copper 1943 cents made but they are extremely rare. Recently, a boy found one in the change in his school's cafeteria line. The value was estimated to be well over \$1 million dollars. There were also a few 1944 steel cents made. Coinage made from 1944 through 1946 were made from recovered cartridge casings Did you know the United States never made a penny? A penny is an British coin. The USA only made cents as there are 100 cents in a dollar.

The variety of paper currency is quite remarkable, and their artwork make them very collectible today. Most of the first bills were printed by banks. The highest denomination was the \$100,000 bill, featuring Pres. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Counterfeiting was a problem, not only for paper money, but for coins too. The author of this article, while metal detecting, found an 1823 counterfeit large cent in Steuben and a counterfeit 1839 half dollar in Trenton Falls.

In April 1833, a Town of Trenton toll gater, Newman Smith, took a \$10 counterfeit bill while working the toll gate on the Deerfield/Trenton Town line. The board of directors of the Utica Turnpike Company (the name of the road through Trenton to the Remsen town line) deducted half of the cost of the fake bill from his pay.

Above is a Spanish Reale from the 1700s minted in Mexico. For many years, Spanish money was popular in international trade. This coin was a "Piece of Eight" some might call it pirate treasure and many still lay at the bottom of the ocean from ship wrecks. If you notice the two pillars on the coin above, they were the origins of the dollar sign that we use today.

\* The U.S. Mint issued two compositions of the nickel in 1942. The standard copper-nickel composition used today and the 35% silver version listed here.

\*\* The 40% silver version of the Eisenhower dollar was issued as a collectible only, they are generally not found in circulation. The best way to distinguish the two versions is by weight. The copper-nickel version weighs 22.68 grams, the silver lke dollar weighs 24.59 grams.
