2021 will be our 18th year. 2020 was not counted due to COVID

Rules:

- 1. You must find it yourself.
- 2. You must find it with a metal detector or eyeballed in the act of detecting.
- 3. A non metallic object can be entered if found while detecting.
 - 4. Multiples, found together can be entered as one.
- 5. You may enter in all 4 categories but only one entry in each.
- 6. Members only, but members as well as guests may vote.
- You must enter your find at the very next meeting you will be attending, no finds from months or years past.
 - 8. You must be present to enter your find
 - 9. Your dues must be up to date to enter.
- 10. No photos of entries. However, if you were asked by someone to search for a specific item, found the item and returned it, a photo then would be permissible.

Points are awarded as follows: One point for simply

entering. 10 points for first. 7 for second. 3rd place receives 5 and the winner in the "Mystery" category will receive 5.

We will break a tie for first place with a show of hands. The loosing entry will be dropped to second, and second place dropped to third. Members who tied for second or third place will both receive the same points

Presidential Choice Award: Occasionally members fail to recognize a deserving entry. So, each month the president will view each entry and award an additional first place prize if he feels it necessary.

Sell your item by giving it a nice presentation and description. Military button.

Vote for what YOU would like to find.

Star Notes

From the Star Notes Web Site

"Many of you have emailed me something along the lines of: "I tried to look up my 1963 \$1 star note, but it isn't an option for the Star Note Lookup. What's the deal?"

The purpose of the star note lookup is to help collectors identify rare modern star notes. Many star notes found in circulation are not worth over face value and can be spent without regret. Some of them can be worth a considerable amount over face value. That depends on the size of the run and the total quantity printed. That's what the Star Note Lookup can tell you. Older star notes are most likely worth more than face value regardless of the quantity printed. If you want more information about older star notes, I recommend buying a reference book like the The Standard Guide To Small-Size US Paper Money 1928 To Date or some of these others.





New club member John Latham talked a little about Star Notes. This is a different way to treasure hunt. Go through your bills and look for a star next to the serial number on any denomination of US Currency. I have posted some of the information that I found plus a photo of some star notes I have, so you can see where to look. Good Luck.

Pull Tab Challenge-2021

When I first joined the EARTH club back in 1996 our club held contests to see how many ring pull tabs one could find in a season. Parks, playgrounds, schoolyards, and ball fields had a staggering number of these tabs buried. They are so numerous that most metal detectors have a "pull tab" icon on their displays. Detectorists have dug countless thousands of these little pesky nuisances over last quarter century, but it seems that we haven't put a dent in their numbers.

As soon as the snow melts and the ground thaws, the EARTH Club will once again be holding a Pull Tab Challenge! Here is a list of the rules: (1) We will be counting ONLY complete vintage ring pull tabs. The "beaver tail" section and the "ring" part, often found separately, cannot be counted. It must be a complete pull tab. The current square tabs that we're all used to seeing today, which were designed to stay on the cans, will not be counted. We've even added a little twist to the game. At the start of the season, every member can submit a guess on the total number of pull tabs they think the entire club will find this year.

This contest is based on the honor system so we ask that you don't team up with another member... it's every man or woman for themselves. This will be fun and we're anxious to see just how many tabs our little club can remove from the ground. We will be awarding prizes down to at least 5 places and maybe all the way to the tenth place. The prize list has not been established yet but could include U.S. mint sets, silver rounds, Franklin & Kennedy halves, along

with detector-related equipment. Members may turn in their Pull tabs at our November meeting or at our

December Christmas Party when the awards will be handed out.
